Clean Out and Recycle

A WORD FROM PASTOR DEAN

Dear Friends,

Thank you for a very good annual meeting celebration yesterday. It was good to begin the day by worshiping together as a community. Thank you to the choir and Sunday school children who shared special music during the service. A big thank you to Mary Cragin for leading the meeting, as she departs from the council this year. I also wish to thank Dayna Dalton, Jean Mani and Tom Thornburgh, who will also be departing from the council. And then I wish to welcome aboard the new council members that you elected on Sunday: Gayle Langer-President, Amy Luebke-Vice President, Patty Manier-Secretary and Linda Schaack-Treasurer. These newly elected folks will join Darlene Wood-Director of Outreach, Sandy Rupnow-Director of Faith Formation, Todd Schaak-Director of Strategic Planning, Jim Foye-Director of Facilities, and myself on the council.

Tom Thornburgh gave an excellent presentation about the Lakeview financial situation at the meeting. Although not in crisis, we do have to be diligent in our regular giving to support the budget this next year. Tom encouraged us to give more to the regular budget and less to the kitchen project right now. The outstanding kitchen loan payments are not in the budget, but rather come from gifts that we make specifically for that. Right now we have accumulated \$10,000 for the kitchen loan payments and we make a payment of \$250 each month. So, if you haven't completed your 2017 pledge card, you are encouraged to do so, keeping the general budget a priority. You passed a budget for 2017 of \$297,989.00. That budget includes a 3% wage increase for all the staff except me. I was given a 1% increase but an extra week of vacation, which is best for me at this time. The budget also includes filling cracks and sealing the parking lot this year, which is necessary to preserve the asphalt so we get many more years of life out of it.

Verallyn Cline and Gayle Langer each gave us updates on the quality and usefulness of the kitchen. I just finished making soup for 80 seniors in the kitchen and I enjoy the room every time I get to use it. What a great space we have created. Jim Foye gave us good news on stopping the water leaks in the Sunday school classrooms.

The youth provided an excellent ending to the morning celebration by serving a baked potato bar with ice cream floats in East Hall. The youth are working hard at raising funds for their summer trip to New York City. They appreciated everyone who supported that lunch, bought Seroogy's candy or given coins in the coin jar. And yes, there will be many more opportunities for you to support their trip, with your dollars, in the upcoming months.

Lent is just around the corner. The seniors are ready for their upcoming trip to Lambeau Field. Road Home volunteers are getting geared up for our host week in April. Two weekly Bible studies are drawing in a large group of participants. The choir works hard every week during rehearsals. The winter youth retreat, in January, was a great success. We are beginning 2017 with solid ministry and dedication coming from many in this congregation. We continue to answer our call to share the gospel as faithfully and as honestly as we know how.
