A WORD FROM PASTOR DEAN

Dear Folks,

Last week I saw a bumper sticker on a car traveling into Madison on Highway 151 from Sun Prairie. It disturbed me. The sticker read, *"If money is the root of all evil, then why are churches always begging for it."* I found this sticker problematic on several levels.

First, I don't think money is the root of all evil and I'm not sure anyone would think it is. We need money. We can't live without money. Some form of money has been part of culture for all times. Can money become evil? Absolutely. Money, like just about anything else we have, can be used for evil. But money by itself is not evil. Only decisions that people make can turn money into evil. I would like to have had that discussion with the man driving the car.

Second, churches do ask for money all the time. If the church did not have access to money, we would not maintain a building or a staff and, therefore, we would not be able to maintain a healthy ministry of outreach and compassion. We ask for money so that we can have a kitchen to prepare meals for homeless families, annual free Thanksgiving dinners and monthly senior lunches. We ask for money so that we can fund the training of Jen's personal care dog. We ask for money so that we can build Donna a ramp. We ask for money so that John can have a knee replacement surgery. We ask for money so that we can help reduce hunger and malaria in our world. We ask for money so that when people come to the church office with needs, we can assist, to some degree, in some situations. Money is what is necessary for ministry. And yes, the church may ask for money frequently, just as the bumper sticker implied. But what the bumper sticker failed to do was to reflect on why that happens. I do wonder if the driver of the car ever needed assistance with housing or food, would he turn to a church, as many folks do?

Our congregation at Lakeview, like many congregations and synagogues, is able to provide much compassionate ministry because of the generous contributions from our members. And I don't believe that your gifts of money come with evil wishes attached to them. The bumper sticker was just plain stupid! And the person who put it on the car certainly didn't have a clear understanding of the church and the role money plays within the faith community. I took offense.

But be prepared, the church at Lakeview will certainly be asking you for money again. The church may even ask you to consider increasing your regular giving. The church, which is made up of you, may even ask you to stretch how you give a bit. But the church will only do that when we believe that we have an opportunity for healthy vital ministry and mission, which is our call as followers of Christ. Thank you for being in this ministry together. If you see that car with that bumper sticker, you may want to enlighten the driver.
