Celebrate Brazil-November 19

The word feijoada comes from the word feijão, which is Portuguese for beans. Feijoada is a black bean stew that is brewed with a variety of salted and smoked pork and beef products and smoked pork spareribs. More traditional feijoada also includes "cheaper" cuts of meat such as pig's ears, feet and tails, and beef tongue. The rich, smoky stew is then served with rice, sautéed kale, and orange slices. It's topped with toasted cassava flour. We will eat at 11:00 am. Sign up in the narthex to come and enjoy fellowship and a new taste experience that you will like. Those who wish may play in the euchre tournament to follow the meal.

Advent/Christmas=Hunger

The season of Advent begins on December 1/2 this year and continues through Dec 24.

Our focus for Advent and Christmas at Lakeview this year is going to be on hunger. The decorations we use in the sanctuary to uplift the season will also focus on hunger. You will not see the traditional "Christmas trees" or greenery. We will not use poinsettias or cyclamen or other flowers this year. Instead we will consider the 821 million people in the world who are undernourished or the 9 million people that die in the world every year from starvation. We will consider our call from Jesus to respond to world hunger. We will consider how God loves us always and has given the world the resources to end hunger. Throughout the four weeks of Advent, Pastor Dean will use special biblical texts, prayers, videos, hymns and sermons to address this topic. You are invited to complete the Advent form in this newsletter and contribute to the cost of the sanctuary decorations. With each gift of \$10, you are invited to identify someone you would like to remember or honor and those names will be printed in the Christmas Eve bulletins. All decorations will be used to assist someone

who is struggling with hunger. Also, from November 24 through December 2 you are invited to pick up a box from the church narthex or office. Then, as a way to mark time this Advent season, your household is invited to place a non-perishable food item in the box each day. Devotions that you may wish to use each day will also be available. On Christmas Eve, you will be encouraged to bring your box with 23 food items to church to be donated to the Lakeview Food Pantry. Together, we will mark time in Advent and remember those who have greater needs than ourselves. We will respond to our call for service during Advent 2018. We hope that many households will pick up a box and participate in this Advent practice. You are encouraged to talk about and even shop together for the things that you will place in the box. Advent is a time of anticipation and sharing. We hope our efforts will encourage you to anticipate and share this year and to give thanks for the resources that you possess.

Chicago Bus Trip

There are still a couple seats available on the Dec 4 bus trip to Chicago. The cost is \$54, which includes the bus, driver, tip, tour guide and ticket to go up the Hancock Building. We will cook our meals together as part of the experience. We will play some games and we will enjoy the grounds and the rec center on Saturday afternoon. Road Home Volunteers Always Needed

The Road Home shelter program has ended, as we knew it, but their other shelter

programs are always in need of volunteers. Their new volunteer model includes the Lakeview Team and we will be assigned 2 months during the upcoming year where we will be the initial contacts to fill available slots. Those slots include 1) helping with children's activities or providing a meal/snack for families that attend classes/workshops at the Road Home main office, 2) organizing and conducting a wish list drive to gather some of our most needed items to be distributed to families moving into housing, and 3) helping plan and organize quarterly family gatherings for families in Road Home housing programs. Alane, the volunteer coordinator at Road Home, is now using a web based monthly calendar to list volunteer opportunities. Once our months are available online, I will publish information in the weekly bulletin, print the monthly schedule and have it available for sign-up at the Information Station. A WORD FROM PASTOR DEAN

Dear Friends,

Sometimes I get frustrated with the world. There is so much anger and hatred. There is such a desire for personal gain and power at the expense of others. Sometimes when I read the news it just feels like we have forgotten about the call to care for one another or to be compassionate to our neighbors and our enemies. I often feel like few people are taking seriously the call to take care of the earth and all of creation. I struggle with political positions or policies that exist across the globe that seem to be thoughtless to the environment and uncaring and insensitive to people. So I have to stop and reflect at times and identify ways that I find hope and good news in the world.

When a youth who attends an ELCA National Youth Gathering with 30,000 other kids from across the nation comes to me and articulates specific ways that the gathering impacted their life, I find hope. We too often think our kids are rolling through those high school years looking for fun, always wanting money, texting on their phones and/or playing video games. And indeed some are, but many are not. And when upbeat faith based music and dynamic speakers and workshops that highlight worldly struggles, presented in a large stadium can move a youth to be changed, than we can have hope. If you were at the worship service and picnic in Poynette in September, you also heard from the youth who attended the gathering this summer in Houston.

When 36 people are interested in going on a trip to New Orleans together from the same congregation, there is hope. That's a large group of adults traveling together, enjoying the sites together, eating meals together, and walking the streets of NOLA together---that's 36 people willing to spend time in fellowship with folks they may not know very well----that's 36 people watching out for each other and striving to help one another have a good experience. That's just cool and very hopeful.

When we hear from our council president that our finances in this congregation are stable, there is hope. It's true that congregations in our community struggle to pay bills or meet payrolls or expand their ministry. We are not wealthy but when I hear that our giving is meeting our budget needs and that we are still raising funds for world hunger, an undocumented college student, a healing house or a member's wheel chair ramp, I find hope.

When 20 adults and 27 kids from the north side are willing to come to our building 2 evenings a week for a four-hour class on personal growth and job skills, there is hope. There is a commitment from folks who want to make their lives and the lives of their children better.

When 28 people show up each week for a Wednesday noon Bible study and find great fellowship in gathering together, there is hope.

When we start preparing to serve 300 meals in East Hall on Thanksgiving Day, because of the profound generosity and ambition of many members of the congregation, there is hope. This event couldn't happen if so many of you were not willing to work together and make changes to your personal schedules.

In your daily lives, when things look bleak, pull out this letter and be reminded of the hopeful and uplifting things that are going on despite the ills of the world. God is at work. God does not abandon the people. God is walking with us. We continue to do God's work with our hands in the world.

Turkey cookers: Please bring your turkey to church FULLY COOKED. Here are some tips from Butterball. This info is for a 10-12 pound turkey: Thaw in the refrigerator for 3 days or in cold water for 6 hours. Cook the THAWED turkey for 3 1/2 to 4 hours at 325 degrees. Remember: If your bird is NOT THAWED, it needs to bake LONGER. Last year we had 3-4 birds NOT totally cooked, which cannot be served.
