A WORD FROM PASTOR DEAN

Resurrection Greetings!

During the summer of 1975, I sang tenor in the Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris France. There were 220 voices in the choir. An 80-piece orchestra accompanied it. The group, America's Youth in Concert, was comprised of high school youth from throughout the United States and sponsored by the Universal Academy of Music from Princeton, New Jersey. A stiff audition procedure was required. Not everyone was accepted. At the end of the Notre Dame concert, we received a standing ovation from over 6000 people who attended. While the tour included concerts in other historical and renowned venues like the Pope's private space in the Vatican, Royal Albert Hall in London, Victoria Hall in Geneva, a mountaintop pavilion in the Alps, St. Mary's Church in Venice, and St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City, the most astonishing venue for me was Notre Dame. The beauty of that historic structure, the acoustics that were unbelievable and the audience of over 6000 people all there for a group of high school youth from the States, made it a remarkable experience that will be etched in my brain forever. And I know that many of you have had an experience in the iconic Notre Dame Cathedral, as well.

And then the fire! Watching this enormous and historical space of worship burn broke my heart. As the roof was caving in and debris was falling, I think I could see the spot in the nave where I stood to sing Franz Hayden's "Mass in Time of War." How many people have had a "God moment" in this building that's nearly 800 years old? Notre Dame opened in 1345! And we think our historic chapel is old.

While some parts of the cathedral have been saved, there is much rubble. There are ashes---from historic and majestic to ashes and rubble. But President Emmanuel Macron says the cathedral will be rebuilt and billions of dollars have already been donated. From ashes to new life! From rubble and destruction, to vitality and purpose. This worship and cultural center will be raised!

It's the Easter Story! From death on a cross and burial in a tomb, Jesus rose to new life. From the ashes of Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday alleluias, we also have hope of a resurrection with Christ. If Christ has been raised from the ashes of death, we, too, can hope to experience a new life, raised from the ashes of our mortal demise.

The Easter season only lasts for 7 weeks each year, until Pentecost. But we celebrate the Easter resurrection from ashes to life every time we gather for worship---all year long! The resurrection story is the foundation of our faith. It is who we are as Christians. It is the gracious promise of God that we simply can't comprehend.

Alleluia, Christ is Risen! Pastor Dean
