# **CROP** Walk

# LOVE IS A VERB

Mark your calendars to attend the special screening of the award winning documentary movie entitled, "Love is a Verb." This 50-minute film will be shown by our Muslim friends at the Niagara Foundation in our sanctuary on Wednesday, October 7 at 6:30 pm. This film examines the Gülen-inspired Hizmet Movement, the Turkish word for "service." The film introduces Mr. Gulen's inclusive philosophy and the dedication of Hizmet volunteers in countries such as Turkey, Bosnia, Iraq and Somalia as they work to build a more cohesive society. From www.loveisaverbmovie.com---Through a co-operation with the people inspired by Gulen, we had an unprecedented access to the ideas and actions of the movement around the world. We met teachers who crawled through a tunnel to open a school in Sarajevo during the war and the students whose lives they changed. We met a Sufi conductor whose orchestra is composed of children whose parents were once at war. We got a glimpse of the interfaith work the movement provides in Turkey, including a visit to Rumi's exquisite shrine. We went to their schools in Turkey, in Somalia, in Iraq. We meet a Kurdish teacher in Iraq who credits everything she is to her former Turkish teachers who stayed during the bombings, and a Kurdish woman who had also gone to one of the Turkish schools in Iraq and is now working as an engineer to bring water to the desert. Finally, in Somalia, we follow two Turkish doctors putting their lives at risk in a place where other relief organizations have deemed too dangerous, a place where they sleep under armed guard. This event would be a perfect opportunity to invite friends, neighbors and other folks of faith to come and experience a movie that reflects the social justice of the Muslim world and

desired by those of us who follow the teachings of Jesus Christ.

# ---www.lakeviewlutheranchurch.org

The church web site is an excellent location to find information about this congregation. On the opening page, various activities and needs are highlighted. There is now a giving page that talks about how you can support the Lakeview Plan for Ministry (budget), the Endowment Fund and the Kitchen Renovation Project. The monthly newsletter, calendar and worship assistant schedule is always posted (including previous issues). You can find the Wedding Policy, Funeral Policy and Affirmation of Household Covenants Policy. In the side bar of the web site, you will find the most recent posts on the Lakeview Facebook page. Videos from the congregation are available on the web site along with a direct link to many ELCA and charitable web sites. There is a direct email link from the web page to the church office.

#### ---Lakeview On Facebook

Lakeview has a Facebook page that includes many pictures and notices about activities, both past and future. Anyone can see the page but if you become a member of the group, you can post information or respond to the posts of others. This is another great way to find out what is going on in this congregation. The majority of the pictures that are taken at Lakeview events are posted here.

## ---Weekly Email Updates from the Pastor

Pastor Dean has an email list of over 80 addresses and sends a weekly update about what is happening at church or what needs the congregation may have. To receive this weekly update, you must assure that Pastor Dean has your current active email address. If you are not receiving these updates, let him know of your address.

#### ---Council Minutes

The minutes from monthly church council meetings are filed in a binder in the church office. They are available for any member of this congregation to come and read. Just stop by and let Laura know that you would like to read previous minutes from the council.

#### ---Information Station

Each Sunday morning our ministry coordinator has information and sign up forms at the Information Station table in the church narthex. Stop by before or after worship to peruse the table and see if there are things that you want to participate in.

# ---Weekly Worship Book

Every week the office staff works to put together the worship service in a readable and easy to use booklet (large print available). This booklet includes several pages of notes and announcements. We encourage you to take your worship book with you after the service so that you have access to those announcements throughout the week. When space in the worship book allows, a weekly calendar is included.

## ---Worship

When you participate in weekly worship, you will share communication. Not only are there verbal announcements during the service, but casual conversations with others will increase connections, fellowship and become times of information sharing. Worship often to stay connected.

#### ---Annual Meeting

The congregation council provides an annual meeting of all members of the congregation according to the church constitution. This meeting is held on a Sunday morning in January. Elections are held and the annual plan for ministry (budget) is reviewed and passed. This is an important meeting for anyone who is confirmed. Voting members are those members who make a financial contribution and receive Holy Communion in the previous 12 months. The council is also discussing the possibility of providing quarterly voter's meetings to provide information even more frequently than once a year.

# Young Family Retreat

We are trying something new this year that we will continue to refine and that we hope will become a regular and enjoyable event. It's a young family retreat. This year it is being held at the Green Lake Conference Center. Our group has room reservations in Kern Lodge (motel type rooms). Meals will be served in the Kraft Center Cafeteria. There will be recreation, relaxation and some guided education. A closing communion worship service will be led by Pastor Dean on Sunday morning. Dates for this event are Friday evening Nov 6 through Sunday morning Nov 8. Cost per family unit is \$288. We reserved 7 rooms and have 6 families committed to attend. Pastor Dean will be leading this study and the group will be looking at issues of hospitality, as well. You should bring a Bible to Circle and plan to rotate in providing a treat for the gathering. Dear Friends,

Giving a hungry person a sandwich is not hospitality. Giving a visitor to church a cup of coffee is not hospitality. Providing a room for a homeless family to sleep in is not hospitality. Are you surprised? Those things are important for survival. They are utilitarian. They are imperative acts for disciples to commit. We should keep doing all of them and more.

But in the church, hospitality happens when we provide for the basic needs of others and, at the same time, recognize that person as someone with dignity and worth. The challenge to faith-based hospitality is to embrace all people as God has embraced us in Christ. This involves developing the skills to see everyone as a child of God, a sinner for whom Christ died, a person bearing the image of God---no matter how obscured the image might be through personal decisions or societal prejudice. Treating other people as people! Looking them in the eye, talking to them, hearing what they have to say, valuing their struggles and opinions, avoiding judgments---this is how hospitality is provided.

You've all been to a congregation or faith-based community where you were ignored. You've all been to a congregation or faith-based community where you were invited to a fellowship time but then sat alone at a table or stood in a corner. You've all been to a congregation or faith-based community where people took an interest in you, asked about you, listened to your story and shared some of their own. Which situation felt like hospitality to you?

Abraham and Sarah welcomed two strangers who showed up at their tent. In doing so, they found out they welcomed God. The people walking to Emmaus invited a stranger on the road to share supper when it got dark and realized that they were actually spending time with Jesus. Jesus took little children on his lap and told us to welcome everyone just as he welcomed the child. And most everyone is familiar with the parable of the Good Samaritan providing care and compassion to someone lying on the side of the road who would not have been considered a friend.

Our congregation provides some elements of hospitality very well. We are gracious people. But we're not perfect people and there are things that we can do even better and more deliberately to be hospitable disciples and to respond to Jesus' words, "when you have done it to the least of these, you have done it to me."

As you continue to extend hospitality to Kris and I and our family during this painful time for us, I give thanks. But I also hope it is that same hospitality that we can together offer to the strangers in our midst, on our streets, in our shelters, in institutions who need a loving smile. May everyone know of God's love for them and may we, the people of Lakeview Lutheran Church, work hard to make that love known practicing hospitality.
