South Central Synod of Wisconsin Annual Assembly

Each year, the 140 congregations in our synod in south western Wisconsin gather for worship, business and education. This year the assembly will be May 5 and 6 at the Kalahari Resort in Wisconsin Dells. Those who attend the assembly include synod staff, all rostered leaders in congregations and voting members from each of the individual congregations. Your voting members from Lakeview this year are Verallyn Cline and Tom Benson. There are two significant highlights of the assembly this year. Bishop Felipe Lozada-Montanez, who is the bishop of the Caribbean Synod of the ELCA and from Dorado Puerto Rico will speak. He will be able to provide updated information on Hurricane Maria recovery and on how the church is working on the islands of the Caribbean. The second important piece of business will be the election of a new bishop for our synod. Bishop Mary Froiland will depart in June. A bishop's term is six years. The election of the next bishop is of interest to you, the people of Lakeview, as it is during this term that Pastor Dean will retire and this congregation will need to work closely with the bishop's office as you seek a new pastoral leader. We will look forward to hearing from Verallyn and Tom once the assembly is over. And thank you to Verallyn and Tom for your willingness to serve Lakeview in this capacity.

A WORD FROM PASTOR DEAN

Dear Friends,

Have you read the short book of First John---not the Gospel of John, but the letter found later in the New Testament? It's a book that gives us rich images of who God is and what we might be as God's faithful people. The word "love" is used frequently in this short book. God is defined as love. According to the author of First John, love is an action. God showed love in the creation. God showed love by creating all genders in the image of God and made us equal and responsible for the care of the earth. God showed ultimate love in the work of the Christ who laid down his life for us. Love was visible in what Jesus did on the cross and in the grave and in the resurrection. For Jesus, love was indeed an action. Jesus lived his life by showing love to those of his world who were hurt and struggling, those we might call downtrodden and outcast. He visited leper colonies, healed blind people, fed thousands, raised folks from their death, uplifted children and widows and spent every day with a variety of sinners, even some ridiculed by society. Jesus spoke in synagogues and ate meals with religious leaders like the Pharisees. Jesus gave us an example of God's love through the life he lived right through his resurrection.

In the third chapter of First John we are called, as followers of Jesus and recipients of God's gracious love, to imitate Jesus. We are called to love one another through our actions. In verse 17 the question is asked, "How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses to help?" Yikes! We have access to many of the world's goods. We have resources that some people in the world could never imagine having. The author of First John asks us how we consider it to be a reflection of love when we don't share our resources with those who have needs. If love is an action, as exemplified by Jesus, than how does hoarding resources reflect that we are followers of Christ and recipients of God's love?

In the church, we are called to take on acts of love, charity and kindness---locally, throughout our country and in the world. We rarely do enough but we give it our best shot. At Lakeview we just celebrated a long tradition of housing homeless families. We just raised nearly \$2000 for an 18-year-old high school student who wants to go to college but has run into many obstacles because he has lived in this country for 17 years but is undocumented. In April we dragged in 320 cans of soup for the pantry and I'm sure we will bring in piles of toilet paper in May.

But reflecting God's love through our actions is also part of our secular world. It is reflected in how we spend our time, where we volunteer, where we donate money, how we vote, how we prioritize our possessions, how we respond to social issues and to people who are not like us. Sharing love through actions is a 24-hour per day job. It never sleeps. There is always an opportunity. I invite you read First John. I invite you to consider how you and I live. I invite you to worship and give thanks often for the love that God has given to you. "And this is God's commandment, that we should believe in the name of Jesus Christ and love one another."
