All You Need To Know About Advent at Lakeview

The season of Advent begins on December 1 this year. This is the four week time before Christmas that the church sets aside to focus on themes of preparation, waiting and hope. We look back to the coming of Christ in Bethlehem. We look forward to his return at an unknown time and location. Like usual, Lakeview will also set aside this special time. Our weekend worship themes in Advent will focus on people who were part of the birth story. November 30/December 1=prophets, December 7/8=angels, December 14/15=shepherds and December 21/22=magi. An Advent wreath will be used to mark time. At each worship service during Advent, there will be a time in the service for members of the congregation to come forward and lay their handwritten prayers and concerns in the manger that will stand in the front of the sanctuary. Holy Communion will be served at each worship service also.

Also, during the season of Advent, you are invited to make a financial contribution, using the form in this newsletter, to assist with hunger related decorations for our sanctuary. As you know, we are not always very traditional with our holiday décor at Lakeview. That is intentional, as it is a response to our call as disciples to respond to need and injustice in the world. Last year, many of us participated in the reverse Advent boxes. Instead of Advent calendars, you can take a box and put one food item in it each day during Advent. Then you may bring your box filled with 23 items to worship on Christmas Eve. This food will all be given to the Lakeview Food Pantry. Although the church will not provide the box this year, you can still arrange your own box and participate. There will also be several special events this year during Advent. You are invited to participate.

Pastor Dean is working on a September 2020 adult trip to Montreal Canada. Montreal is in the province of Quebec. The city population is around 1,800,000 people. It is an island on the St. Lawrence Seaway. The official language spoken in 49% of homes is French. Montreal is often considered the most European city in North America. It is diverse and cosmopolitan with great food, music, theater and sports. A trip to Montreal would include visiting the open market in Little Italy, spending time in the historic Old City (French), going to the old port, experiencing the underground city and the botanical gardens. There would also be worship at the Notre Dame Basilica and history at the Chateau Ramezey. Of course, a trip to Montreal must include a visit to Mont Royal, a large park in the center of the city and as the name implies, a hill! Everyone would be required to try Montreal's famous dishpoutine. Its French fries covered in gravy and melted cheese curds. We would fly from O'Hare in Chicago and take a bus back and forth. A WORD FROM PASTOR DEAN

Dear Friends,

Whose birthday is it anyway? We come to this month of December and I wonder who is really having a birthday. The gifts, the decorations, the cards, the food, the beverages, the music, the parties, the cookies, the concerts, the sleigh bells, the trees---who are we recognizing in December with all this stuff? I find those signs with Christmas trees on them that say, "Let's Put Christ Back in Christmas" humorous. There is no Christ in a Christmas tree. I think that decorative flags and cards that say, "Jesus is the reason for the season" are hypocritical. I am offended when a store clerk wishes me a Merry Christmas as I check out. There is no for-profit retail establishment that is really concerned about me having a good celebration of my Savior's birth. It's all so insincere. It's all so commercialized. It's all so self-centered. Family isn't the most important part of Christmas. Carols are not the most important part of Christmas. Good cheer is not the most important part of Christmas. It's really quite simple. The only reason there is a Christmas is because a baby was born and laid in a cow manger one evening in Bethlehem. There were no parades, cards, cookies, gifts, special meals, trees, ornaments, lights or decorations. It was quiet and lonely. It was dirty, dingy and practical. They made do with what was available. And within that context, the most important thing happened for you and me. Our Savior was born.

Wouldn't it be great if we could celebrate our Savior's birth with the simplicity of that first night? Wouldn't it be great if our celebration of our Savior's birth really was about the Savior? Whose birthday is it anyway? What would Jesus wish for on his birthday? How are you doing with that?

In Luke 4:18 we hear Jesus read the prophet Isaiah to explain why he came to earth, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free." How would Christmas look if we took that text seriously?

May you each find Christmas 2019 to be a time to give thanks for the gift of salvation and to be a time to bring good news to the poor and to let the oppressed go free. Now that would be a Merry Christmas.
