## Special Epiphany Worship

It is an island on the St. Lawrence Seaway. The official language spoken in 49% of homes is French. Montreal is often considered the most European city in North America. It is diverse and cosmopolitan with great food, music, theater and sports. A trip to Montreal would include visiting the open market in Little Italy, spending time in the historic Old City (French), going to the old port, experiencing the underground city and the botanical gardens. There would also be worship at the Notre Dame Basilica and history at the Chateau Ramezey. Of course, a trip to Montreal must include a visit to Mont Royal, a large park in the center of the city and as the name implies, a hill! #### A WORD FROM PASTOR DEAN

#### Dear Friends,

I suppose it is typical that a pastor looks toward the new year and contemplates what kinds of ministry their congregation might accomplish. I would guess that most pastors are like me as they consider the things that didn't go so well the previous year along with the successful programs they experienced. The new year is often the time to think about direction and risks and challenges.

Recently an outsider asked me why I have been here for over 18 years. They had experienced a rapid change in pastoral leadership in their congregation and wanted to know what the people of Lakeview did to keep me around. My response was "they have always been willing to grow and take on new challenges." It's true. The people who make up Lakeview Lutheran Church are not stuck in history, tradition or orthodoxy. You are not unwilling to look at how the church should be the church in a changing world and society. Together we have tried and accomplished new things. As your pastor, you have been willing to consider ideas that I propose and directions that I suggest we might go and that has been a vital reason for my longevity here. We have been a team.

So, as I think about how we can continue to be the church in 2020, I think about these things. I would like to see us become a Reconciled in Christ congregation. While we have always been open and accepting of people of all gender expressions and orientations, and while we have a policy that included blessing same gender unions long before two people of the same gender could legally marry, we have never become a recognized reconciled congregation. If we did that, we would make a statement to the Christian community that all are truly welcome here.

I would like to consider revising our worship plans in the upcoming year. We could evaluate if times and dates for worship are practical and encouraging for people to attend. We could consider our style of worship and what would be most uplifting and enlightening in today's world. We could consider if an off-sight worship opportunity each week would be beneficial. This means

making changes and like everything else in our lives, we should consider if change in the congregation could benefit more people.

I would like us to consider how our building gets used. We make our building available to many charitable and non-profit organizations. Sometimes the building is very busy. At the same time, because of the room configuration and room size, many parts of our building get minimal use. We should look at what alterations might be made in our building and how those alterations could contribute to additional ministry and service for ourselves and for our neighbors in upcoming years.

I would like to increase the number of people who participate in Bible study. We have a large group of folks who attend a study on Wednesday at noon. We have another solid group who attend a study on Sunday morning. But what dates and times and topics might welcome those who find existing times difficult to participate in?

I would like to continue to look at what we use to measure activity, interest and success in the congregation. In the ELCA, like many other denominations, we often evaluate the success and activity of a congregation through worship attendance and financial giving. In the ELCA we call it the trend report. While there is valuable information in the "trend report," it paints a very limited picture of what a congregation is, does or has the potential to be. So many activities, events and studies here at Lakeview, like other congregations, are not reflected in the trend report. We, like many, have seen a decrease in worship attendance. But do we see a decrease in activity within our congregation? Should we put our energy in increasing worship attendance or are there better places to place our energy so that we can make the grace of God known in the world?

It's a new year. We have lots to do. I am not a person who is able to be comfortable with the status quo and you know that. So, with the power of the Holy Spirit and the strength of God's unconditional love, I hope we can together make 2020 a year to remember.
