We have been experiencing regular service to the boiler system and the church council has decided that the time has arrived to look at updating and revising the system this summer. At this time, we have \$24,801 put aside in our Endowment Fund that can go toward this update. However, we know that the final cost will be far more than this amount. We also realize that we will not be able to do effective ministry like operate a weekly food pantry, host quarterly blood drives, serve a Thanksgiving Dinner, prepare meals for Porchlight and so much more, without adequate heat. So, this year our Super Bowl offering will go into that HVAC account. You are invited to make a generous gift. You can make your check to Lakeview. You can note that it is for HVAC. A WORD FROM PASTOR DEAN

Dear Friends,

This may be an odd letter. I want to invite you to do something that most of you have never done. Take your Bibles (*or borrow one if you can't find yours*). Any translation is fine. Turn to the Old Testament Book called Song of Solomon *(sometimes Song of Songs)*. Read the short 8 chapters-they are very poetic.

This is the most unusual biblical book there is. The story never mentions God or any type of religious practices. It is a lust story between a man and a woman. It's a story about the beauty and power of human love. This book considers the goodness of creation, human bodies and sexuality. There is mutual attraction, commitment, faithfulness and respect. You are going to find this story unusual, sensual, maybe even a little offensive. You will wonder why no one has ever made a movie from this book. But you should read it. It's in our holy book.

Then, once you have finished, you are going to say, "Why is that story in our Bible?" And that is a darn good question. So, I want to invite you to do a second thing. Come to a general discussion on the Song of Solomon on Sunday, February 16 and Sunday, February 23 at 10:00am in the Fellowship Room. Coffee and hot beverages will be waiting. After reading the book, we will gather to share our impressions and ideas, concerns and our bewilderment. We will learn from each other. And we will celebrate both human and divine love. And I assure you there will be humor.

So, read Song of Solomon. Come to the gathering on February 16 and 23 in the Fellowship Room. And always be wondering what God is up to!
