FROM THE INTERIM PASTOR'S DESK...

The Verdict

In my personal opinion, we have a frustratingly slow, complex, and imperfect legal system which is made all the more so by politics, social divides, prejudices, and the influence of wealth. While justice is meant to be blind, impartial, and fair, our history is full of incidents where Justice seems to be peeking from beneath her blindfold and tipping the balances in favor of one side or the other. (I should also note that I am not any kind of expert on our legal system and have very little direct experience of it, so these are my opinions as a casual observer.)

There is enough uncertainty in our system that, as we awaited the verdict coming out of Minneapolis in the trial for the murder of George Floyd, I felt that there would be both surprise and no surprise no matter what the verdict would be, and that there is enough division in our country that there would also be both claims that justice was done and that justice was averted.

As we view the verdict in this case, and the issues that divide us in our country, I find it helpful to think about what St. Paul would call "the rulers,... the authorities,... the cosmic powers of this present darkness," and "the spiritual forces of evil...", that is, all that holds us "captive to sin" so that "we cannot free ourselves," and then to remember a different verdict and its implications for us.

The Powers

What is St. Paul talking about when he mentions these "cosmic powers," or "spiritual forces?"

As Lutherans, we can think about them as "sin, death, and the power of the devil," as all of the things that we confess and repent of, as all that would separate us from God, from following Jesus, from being the image of God we were created to be, and from living our lives as witnesses of Jesus Christ.

As Americans, we can think about the systems within our society that prevent our ideals of equality and justice from being made available to all people: Our "original sin" of slavery and the accompanying racism codified and embedded in our society and in our lives; The "love of money" and the pursuit of wealth to the detriment of human relationships, the common good, and the environment; American individualism and the idea of personal responsibility which claim that each person is fully responsible for his or her own place in society; The myth of morality which divides people and ideas into "good or bad," "right or wrong," "holy or unholy."

The Verdict

The verdict tells us that we are each caught up in the powers and systems that separate us from God. As St. Paul says, "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." There is no "Us versus Them." There is no "Them" at all. We are all part of the "Us." Whether liberal or conservative, We are all one. And the verdict is against us. I am not "Holy." You are not "Holy." We cannot make ourselves holy by our own actions or thoughts or positions.

What I am – is loved. What you are – is loved. What our neighbor is – is loved. We are loved by God, and we are to love one another. My love is imperfect, and your love is flawed, and our neighbor's love is intermittent, but God's love is perfect and incomprehensible and greater than we are able to imagine.

The verdict is in. We are guilty, but we are called by God, we are forgiven, and we are sent to love as we have been loved.
